AUSLÄNDER CORRESPONDENCE

We can't believe that it's already been a year since we said "adieu" to our friends at the Swiss Club.

As soon as we arrived in Switzerland, we moved into my grandparents' old farmhouse, the "tan." We started exploring all of the familiar places that weren't so familiar anymore. Do you know what it's like to hear the name of a place, town or street where you grew up – a place you've never been before, but for some reason you feel like you know it because it's where you grew up? That's what it was like for us after we moved here. We took day trips on Roland's days off and visited Schaffhausen, Bachtel, the Klausenpass, Amden, Stoos and much more. These places sounded familiar, so familiar that we felt like we'd been there before, but when we moved here it was almost as if we were discovering a new country for the first time.

Roland started working at "Speck," a restaurant at a small, private airfield in Feraltdorf outside of Zurich. He enjoyed the work and his co-workers, but he quickly realized he had a lot to learn: how to cook with electricity instead of gas, how to work a "hold-o-matic," how to use a steamer. It was a great place for him to get familiar with the ways of the Swiss restaurant business. Meanwhile, Doris was focusing on getting better and tending to the vegetable garden at the farmhouse.

We appreciate life here in Switzerland. Things like the quality of the health care system, the speed of the insurance company, the friendliness of people at Coop and Migros, and the efficiency of the DOT wowed us when we arrived. You should have seen the woman who helped us when we registered our car – her face when we pulled out our old paper "fahrzeug ausweis" (Vehicle passport) from 1976 was priceless!

At the end of the summer, we decided to move to canton Bern where Doris grew up. Roland found a new job in Nidau, a town just outside of Biel. And now, for the second time our life, we live in an apartment. It's been a steep learning curve because there are very strict rules we need to follow: set laundry days, quiet time from 12-2pm, no mowing the lawn on your lunch break, no hanging laundry out on Sundays, no vacuum cleaning or hammering on the weekends...

Roland went to the city hall recently to register his bicycle to get the rectangular license plate. The woman looked at him as if he were from another planet. (Editor's note: A common theme apparently!) "I'm sorry, what?" "You need what? For what?" "Häää?" Then she sent him to the police station and the officer there had a similar reaction: "You need what exactly?", and then finally, "Oh! You don't have an e-bike? Well then you don't need to register... we don't do that anymore."

We like how life here forces us to slow down. No shopping from 12-2pm because small shops – grocery stores, clothing stores, pharmacies – are closed. In the evening, most stores close around 6pm, unless it's Thursday or Friday and then they stay open late... until 8pm. This makes Saturday a crazy shopping day at Migros. Almost every store or restaurant is closed on Sundays, and since you can't go shopping or go out to eat, you go for walks or hikes. Or you watch sports on TV for 10 hours straight (the Swiss are nuts about sports!).

So far, we don't really miss the US. We do miss Simone and our friends though.

It's not easy to make new friends in Switzerland. People keep to themselves and it usually takes time before you can use "du" – the informal tense – with someone. It gets easier if you belong to a sports team or group like the "turnverein," "musikverein," "feuerwehr" or any of the other obscure clubs that exist. That's where you find like-minded people and the "kamaradschaft" that the Seattle Swiss Club has. We'll find something eventually, but for now we're just taking it easy.

We've welcomed many visitors over the past year and we're always excited to show people around Nidau. If you're passing through Europe or Switzerland, don't forget to let us know. We'd love to see you!

And that's it for now. We love it here and we plan on staying, maybe we'll start the Swiss Seattle Club. If we do, you're all invited.

- Roger Federer won his 20th Grand Slam title in Australia as the first male player to win so many titles. Now 36 years old, this make him the most successful tennis player of all time. He has contributed a lot to Switzerland's worldwide image not only with his tennis accomplishment but also with his humble demeanor and his dedication to family life. My wife Laura says his good looks do not hurt him either.
- As of January 1, 2018, an apostille is required on all American civil status documents, including affidavit. Civil status changes (marital status, birth of children, death, name change, etc.) must be communicated to the Consulate General of San Francisco.
- An apostille is an additional form of authentication. Once you have certified the original document by a notary public you must send it to Olympia for additional certification. It can be done by mail, costs \$15 and instructions are here: sos.wa.gov/corps/apostilles/howtoobtainanapostilleorcertainment.aspx
